Scenic Highways: The Martin Grade named Florida's 25th Scenic Highway

"...Martin County citizens worked for eight years to protect the 100-year-old oak trees that line The Martin Grade, which was threatened in 2007 by regional traffic planners' plan to four-lane County Road 714 between State Highways 609 and 710. This would have required bulldozing the historic tree canopy.

The Martin Grade Scenic Highway is the only Florida Scenic Highway designation that was independently lobbied for by citizens, but county officials consistently supported the application. County Commissioner John Haddox is a member of the Martin Grade Team which made protecting the trees its No. 1 priority in the Corridor Management Plan submitted to the state.

'It was a long, complicated process,' said Rob Dawson in a news release. He was the member of the team who oversaw the completion of the Eligibility Application and successfully

presented it to the Scenic Highway Advisory Committee in Tallahassee. 'Gaining the Scenic Highway designation isn't the end. It's just the beginning. Now we can start doing what we set out to do: protecting the trees and educating the public about Martin County's unique ecology and history.'

This historic, 12-mile road is shaded by a canopy of hundred-year-old oaks and surrounded by pastures, groves, swamps, and woods just as it was when it was carved out of the wilderness by the region's earliest settlers.

Because The Martin Grade has no commercial development along its path, it's difficult to raise money for road maintenance.

The Scenic Highway Manual requires The Martin Grade Scenic Highway Team develop an interactive website, design a corridor logo, print educational materials and install informational kiosks at key points along the road.

The group will apply for grants and attempt to raise additional funds..."

Ft. Lauderdale: Vision Zero

"If you can imagine a year when no one gets killed crossing a street, riding a bike or driving a car here, someone might ask what you've been smoking.

It's a pretty far-fetched notion in a city with the nation's second-highest pedestrian fatality rate and fifth-highest overall traffic fatality rate, based on 2012 U.S. Department of Transportation figures, the latest national data available.

But that's the goal of Vision Zero, an ambitious city initiative to eliminate all road deaths and serious injuries within its borders.

Vision Zero is a holistic program started in Sweden two decades ago to curb that country's rising traffic death toll by enlisting all its citizens in an effort to make streets safer.

'We are committed to changing the mindset that traffic deaths and injuries are 'accidents',' said Debbie Griner, Fort Lauderdale's transportation manager. 'Instead, they are incidents that can be avoided and through the collaborative effort of Vision Zero Fort Lauderdale, everyone has an opportunity to save lives.

'Every little action, it all adds up,' Griner said. 'It all adds up to zero.'

Sweden has seen its traffic death rate cut in half since its program began in 1997. Vision Zero came to America in 2013, when New York Mayor Bill de Blasio followed through on a campaign commitment. The Big Apple in 2014 recorded its lowest number of pedestrian deaths since it began keeping records a century ago. Its total traffic fatalities dropped 15 percent from the previous year.

Fort Lauderdale is the first city in Florida — and the Southeastern U.S. — to sign up.

'It's about changing our legacies,' said Greg Stuart, director of the Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization. 'Do we want to be known as the place where if you walk across the street, you're probably going to be hit by a car?'

The road situation isn't getting any better, as distracted drivers and pedestrians pay more

attention to their smartphones than to what's happening around them.

As part of Vision Zero, the city is partnering with the MPO, the county and the state transportation department. It's creating a 'team of champions' who will set milestones — including a target date for reaching fatality-free roadways — and putting together proposals that city staff will turn into a five-year plan that will help measure progress. The plan will rely on five 'E's': Engineering, evaluation, education, encouragement and enforcement.

The city has hosted a number of educational events already. It plans another Alert Today Alive Tomorrow event Feb. 2 at Broward Boulevard and Andrews Avenue, where dozens of yellow-shirted volunteers will distribute material educating people on foot and in cars about safe behavior and will assist pedestrians crossing the streets.

The Police Department on Dec. 13 started a half-year High Visibility Enforcement initiative along eight major roadways: Federal Highway, State Road A1A, Sunrise and Broward boulevards between Federal Highway and Interstate 95, Las Olas Boulevard east of Andrews Avenue and State Road 84 between Andrews Avenue and I-95.

Officers will be handing out educational material to pedestrians, cyclists and drivers through March. They will then issue warnings to people breaking traffic laws during April and will ticket violators in May.

While all the 'E's' are important, engineering is the one that's going to make the biggest difference in saving lives, said Leah Shahum, founder and director of the San Francisco-based Vision Zero Network, which is assisting cities involved in the initiative.

'What we've learned in cities across the country, where we can have the most impact is in making lasting, physical changes,' Shahum said. Those changes can be adding bike lanes or crosswalks and redesigning roads in ways that encourage slower traffic speeds.

Vision Zero is a data-driven approach prioritizing safety over speed, Shahum said. Cities look at where collisions are occurring and analyze traffic patterns so they can spend limited dollars where they're needed the most, she said.

When it comes to safety, nobody's perfect.

'People make mistakes,' Shahum said. 'We can design streets that are more forgiving, less dangerous.'

Fort Lauderdale, for instance, is planning to add 6-foot-wide bike lanes on Powerline Road north of Sunrise Boulevard, with an additional 3-foot-wide buffer from the passing cars. The city will be encouraging cyclists to use an app called Strava, that records information about where they're riding into a state database, which will use the data to determine the streets most heavily used by cyclists so bike-lane improvements can be focused there.

The work is an extension of the city's 'complete streets' efforts that design roads for all users.

The MPO's Stuart said something as innocuous as a bus stop location can make a difference. Most stops are placed mid-block instead of at intersections where there are crosswalks, he said, making it more likely that departing passengers will jaywalk to get to the other side of the street.

'Who's more likely to be walking? Somebody getting on and off a bus,' Stuart said. 'How do you educate the people that are scheduling the buses that maybe this isn't the best location?'

More 'wayfaring' signs are also needed because of the city's substantial number of tourists, who can be distracted walking or driving while hunting for their destination.

Not only will the end result save lives, but it will be a paradigm shift and produce less congestion, city planner Karen Mendrala said. Fewer crashes means fewer traffic tie-ups for drivers, she said. And as the safety of walking and biking increases, more people will leave their cars at home, she said.

Robin Haines Merrill, who fought for years to get the city and county to approve a needed crosswalk on Las Olas Boulevard at Southeast 13th Avenue, is impressed the city has embraced such a 'radical' approach. She's not naive about the difficulty in achieving the goal.

'We've got to ring the bell really loud. This is not just a traffic safety issue. This is a moral issue. It comes from our core,' said Merrill, a Las Olas Boulevard gallery owner and a Christian missionary.

The statistics cry out for action because everyone is at fault, she said...'
